He also called for a day of fasting, penance and prayer for peace.

The Society of Jesus (Jesuits) endorse the Pope's unconditional call for peace.

The Society of Jesus has been present at the heart of the conflict in Israel-Palestine and throughout the Middle East. Jesuits have been deeply engaged in dialogue with Jews. Fully committed to the uprooting of the teaching of contempt for Jews, anti-Judaism and anti-Semitism, the Society of Jesus also recognizes the rights of Jews in Israel and everywhere else in the world. Never again must Jews be murdered, raped, maimed, tortured, kidnapped and threatened.

Jesuits have also been deeply engaged in dialogue with Muslims who form the majority of Palestinians together with the Christian Palestinians. They are fully committed to the building up of multicultural and multireligious societies in Palestine and throughout the Middle East. They are active in the fight against Islamophobia and racism. Palestinians have the right to live everywhere in their homeland in dignity and peace. Never again must Palestinians be murdered, buried under the rubble of their homes, expelled, starved, collectively punished and exiled.

It is time to say, stop the killing and promotion of ideologies that permit it. Stop instrumentalizing religion for political power projects. Decades of violent conflict have brought nothing but ruin on the entire region and escalation of hatred. The only possible victory is the fruit of a struggle for justice and peace, equality and reconciliation.

Today, in this time of engulfing darkness and death, let us embrace the invitation to take the side of peace. \blacksquare

The evening is one of the most popular fundraisers as guests learn about a variety of Scotches, enjoy a delicious meal, and mingle with friends.



An Active Life of Serving Others: Father Bernie Carroll, SJ

Bernard (Bernie) Carroll, SJ knew he wanted to join the Jesuits as early as high school.

"I admired and appreciated the Jesuits' spirit and zeal," says Fr. Carroll. "Priesthood was not the first motivating factor, but the Jesuits' zest for life."

That enthusiasm for life has been reflected in his many roles as a Jesuit priest including pastor, college campus minister, assistant novice director, vocations director, spiritual director, superior, and shrine director, to name a few.

Fr. Carroll entered the Jesuits in 1959, was ordained in 1971, and by 1972 he was a lecturer in French as well as a campus minister at Campion College in Regina, SK. In 1979, he was appointed assistant novice director for the Jesuits of English Canada.

From 1982 to 1986, Fr. Carroll was vocations director, which ended when he was invited to be part of the team animating formation ministry with Indigenous people at the Anishinabe Spiritual Centre in Espanola, ON. Four years later, he joined the retreat team at Loyola House in Guelph, ON. In the summer of 2000, Fr. Carroll became the first Jesuit pastor of Holy Rosary Parish in Guelph.

"I enjoyed parish liturgical, sacramental ministry as well as fostering the active participation of many parishioners on innumerable committees serving the liturgical, pastoral-spiritual, financial and outreach needs of the community," says Fr. Carroll. In 2010, he was appointed director of Martyrs' Shrine in Midland, ON. There he enjoyed ministering to thousands of pilgrim visitors and to the Indigenous community on Christian Island. During this time, many innovations were undertaken, including preparation for the year-round residency of the Shrine's Jesuit community. When Fr. Carroll left Martyrs' Shrine, Indigenous leader Rosella Kinoshameg, presented him with an eagle feather, one of the highest Indigenous honors, as well as a deerskin stole, on behalf of the Shrine's Board of Trustees.

In 2016, Fr. Carroll returned to Loyola House as a spiritual director and was able to pursue pastoral interests in individual and communal spiritual growth, in evolutionary and eco-spirituality in the spirit of Jesuit Pierre Teilhard de Chardin.

"It was in these years that I came to understand and appreciate profoundly the importance of prayer and the presence of the Holy Trinity in everything that exists," says Fr. Carroll.

Last fall, Fr. Carroll became superior of the Pickering, ON Jesuit community and the René Goupil House infirmary. He speaks of great gratitude for the blessings in his life.

"I am deeply grateful to the Holy Trinity, who has always been at my side; to Jesuit confreres, to many friends and my family who have loved and supported me through the ups and downs of my life, and to our benefactors who have generously enabled me to be a Jesuit for 64 years."

DONOR PROFILE

The Phelan Family: Love of Jesuits and the Church

hen the Phelan family talks about their deep Catholic faith they like to focus on their late brother, Jesuit Father Dan Phelan, their sister Mary Jo, and their loving parents Hugh and Mary who instilled a strong faith in their nine children.

"Our parents gave daily witness to a strong faith built on prayer, trust in God's holy will and providence," says daughter Theresa Phelan. "They were very active in all aspects of the Church."

The Phelan parents were Irish immigrants arriving in Regina, SK in 1951. The family was first introduced to the Jesuits at Campion College High School where the Phelan sons were students.

Hugh and Mary Phelan along with their many Irish immigrant friends tackled the debt of a newly built gymnasium by running bingos every Saturday night and various other fundraisers for years until the debt was paid. Jesuit Father James Farrell, who was principal at the time, became a lifelong friend. Their support followed him when he became director of Martyrs' Shrine in Midland, ON in 1981.

One of their sons, Dan, joined the Jesuits in 1964, who, along with his priestly duties, became a gifted spiritual director at Loyola House in Guelph and the Manresa Jesuit Spiritual Renewal Centre in Pickering. Later he was a much beloved priest at Our Lady of Lourdes Parish where he became seriously ill and died in 2008. Many people have said that Fr. Phelan was one of the best spiritual directors.

"Through Dan we studied the life of St. Ignatius, his early companions and many others like Gerard Manley Hopkins," says Phelan. "The Jesuits' example of social justice for all was inspirational...working with our Indigenous peoples, the poor, and those suffering in many situations."


Mary Jo Phelan Beveridge lived and worked in the Jesuit farm community in Guelph for five years. She experienced first-hand the tremendous compassionate and caring value of everyone given into their hands by God. Many of the priests and brothers she worked with continue to be life-long family friends.



The Feast of St. Ignatius of Loyola

World Youth Day Pilgrimage to Martyrs' Shrine

This past summer, a group of university students completed a four-day pilgrimage to Martyrs' Shrine in Midland, ON in order to be united in spirit with youth attending the international World Youth Day in Lisbon, Portugal.

The students departed from Holy Rosary Jesuit parish in Guelph on July 30 and headed to Martyrs' Shrine where they gathered for Ignatian spiritual conversation, prayer, contemplation, and the examination of conscience. The theme of the pilgrimage was "adventures under the banner of the cross."

Jesuit Father Vernon Boyd, SJ accompanied and led the students from Queens University, the University of Waterloo, the University of Guelph, and the University of Toronto. The pilgrims arrived on the eve of the Feast of St. Ignatius of Loyola, July 31, and were welcomed by Fr. Michael Knox, SJ, former director of the Shrine. Fr. Knox spoke on the spirituality of the Jesuits, the lives of the Canadian Jesuit martyrs, the political and religious context of the 17th century, the Jesuit Relations and First Nations.

The pilgrims were united in prayer with the 1.5 million youth attending World Youth Day in Lisbon.

The days were filled with powerful moments of personal stories, faith sharing, and the discernment of spirits seeking the will of God in their lives.

The pilgrimage included celebration of Holy Mass at the gravesite of St. Jean de Brébeuf in the Church of St. Joseph. Pilgrims also walked the 13-kilometre route to St. Ignace, the martyrdom site of Saints Jean de Brébeuf and Gabriel Lalemant. After Mass, the group set up camp for the night. On the final day of the pilgrimage, August 2, the students celebrated Mass on the Feast of Jesuit St. Peter Faber.

During the night the pilgrims observed a rare Blue Moon which cast a radiant light upon the cross that marked the place where Brébeuf and Lalemant were martyred. The phenomena led the pilgrims further and deeper into powerful conversation of the presence of God in all things under the banner of the cross.

The pilgrims received many graces during the pilgrimage and offered to God, through the intercession of the Canadian Martyrs, their heartfelt desire to serve God in the vocation to which each is being called under the banner of the cross for the Greater Glory of God.

FATHER ROBERT C. BRENNAN, SJ

AUG. 28, 1945 – SEPT. 2, 2023 Father Rob Brennan died at the Jesuit Infirmary, René Goupil House, in Pickering, ON, September 2, 2023. He

entered the Society of Jesus in 1970 and was ordained in 1979. After tertianship in the Philippines, he made final vows at Brebeuf High School in 1984. Fr. Brennan's Jesuit life was defined by high school teaching and chaplaincy and particularly by his connection with Loyola High School in Montreal. He spent time as a regent there, followed by Brebeuf College School in Toronto for 10 years, before returning to Loyola for 12 years as chaplain. He then served four years as coordinator of the pastoral team at St. Paul's High School before returning to Loyola in 2006, where he served as teacher, chaplain, and president of the high school.

Fr. Brennan had a love for the students and faculty. He made deep and lasting connections with hundreds of them. Sacramental ministry was at the heart of his Jesuit life, and he connected with the families of his students. He was even an enthusiastic coach of sports teams. Fr. Brennan had a special place in his heart for his experiences in the Philippines and for the Indigenous peoples he served in Northern Ontario. He was also a great mentor of younger Jesuits.



BROTHER PAUL A. DESMARAIS, SJ

MAR. 9, 1945 – AUG. 16, 2023 Brother Paul Desmarais died on August 16, 2023 at René Goupil House. He was born at Pointe-aux-Roches, near

Windsor, ON. Brother entered the novitiate in 1964. After first vows, he began agricultural studies at the University of Guelph. His family had been farmers for three generations. During his novitiate, Brother was interested in going to Darjeeling, India but the Curia in Rome asked the Canadian Jesuits to send men to Zambia. His first visit to Africa in 1969 lasted one month, since he was still in university.

In 1971, Brother was assigned to the Kasisi Mission in Zambia. They had a great need for training farmers, so in 1974 Bro. Desmarais founded the Kasisi Agricultural Training Centre. For the next 50 years, he applied his energy and knowledge for the benefit of locals. A principal innovation was to completely switch to organic farming. In May 2014, Kasisi was chosen by the United Nations Development Program as one of 25 outstanding sustainable development

initiatives around the globe. The UNDP singled out Kasisi for its practical steps to preserve Zambia's rural environment, by training more than 10,000 small-scale farmers in sustainable farming techniques. The discovery of a brain tumour in 2022 brought Brother to Canada for emergency surgery. The initial post-op report indicated hope but later it was clear that his health was compromised. After the difficult prognosis, Brother travelled to Martyrs' Shrine, Midland and spent time praying before the relics of the Jesuit martyrs.



FATHER BLAISE JASCHKÓ, SJ

FEB. 3, 1922 - Nov. 5, 2023 Father Balázs (Blaise) Jaschkó died on November 5, 2023 at René Goupil House. He was 102 and was born in

Kassa, (Košice), Slovakia as the ninth child. Two of his brothers became Jesuits and one of his sisters joined the Society of the Sacred Heart.

He entered the Society of Jesus at Budapest in September 1940. Soon after, Nazis occupied Kassa, then the Soviets, and in 1945, Kassa came under Czechoslovakia. In 1948, he began his first year of theology in Hungary, but was unable to continue because the rector encouraged theologians to escape communism to the West. In 1949, he arrived in Austria to study theology and later completed these studies in Italy, where he obtained a licentiate in theology in 1952 and was ordained a priest. In 1953, Fr. Jaschkó was missioned to Hamilton, ON to serve at St. Elizabeth of Hungary Parish and secretary to the vice-provincial. In 1955, he edited the Hungarian Sacred Heart Messenger. A year later, he was sent to St. Peter's Preparatory School, in New Jersey, to teach religion, Latin and French. He attended Laval University over many summers to obtain a master's degree in French.

In 1970, Fr. Jaschkó left America to help at St. Elizabeth's in Toronto. He became pastor and served from 1970 to 2000. Between 1971-1978, he was the superior of the Hungarian Jesuits in Canada and from 1990-2003, he was the regional superior of the Hungarian Jesuits in North America. During a sabbatical in 1986, Fr. Jaschkó took a course in scripture in Jerusalem, met with Mother Teresa in Calcutta, and visited the Hungarian missionaries in the Far East. In 2000, he visited his brother in Taiwan on his 90th birthday. In 2003, Fr. Jaschkó was re-appointed superior of the Hungarian Jesuits in Canada. In 2015, he moved to René Goupil House.

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FATHER JOHN D. MATHESON, SJ

JUL. 3, 1930 - OCT. 19, 2023 Father John Matheson died on October 19, 2023 at René Goupil House. He was born in Brooklyn, NY. When he was seven, his

American mother and Canadian father moved to Clyde River, NS, where his father was born. There was no electricity, and the school was a one-room schoolhouse. When he was 12, his father joined the Canadian military and Mrs. Matheson and her son moved to an apartment in Bridgewater and he attended St. Mary's High School in Halifax.

Fr. Matheson entered the Jesuits in 1951. Regency was at St. Mary's High School. Two years later, he returned to Toronto to study English at the University of Toronto, and later at Gonzaga University in Spokane, WA. He was ordained in 1965.

Fr. Matheson started teaching at Campion College, Regina, SK in 1967 where he lectured in film studies. To further his skills, in 1969 he began studying Communication Arts at the University of California. During that four-year period, he was also director of the Media Center for Black Catholics. Back in Toronto in 1973, Fr. Matheson was appointed promoter of the apostolate of Modern Communications Media. After two years, he went to Winnipeg to become chaplain and media professor at St. Paul's College. He returned to Campion College in 1977 as professor of film media, which kept him busy for 19 years. Early on, Fr. Matheson exhibited a strong passion for social justice. In later life, he ministered to Chinese Catholics. In 2002, he created a ministry for prisoners in the local penitentiary named Friends on the Outside (FOTO), which centered on restorative justice. In 2017, he moved to René Goupil.



FATHER JOHN J. PUNGENTE, SJ

DEC. 22, 1939 - DEC. 6, 2023 Father John Pungente died on December 6, 2023 at René Goupil House. He was born at Port Arthur, ON, but his early life was spent

in Brandon, MB, where his father worked in a theatre. Fr. Pungente entered the Jesuits in 1957. He completed philosophy studies at Mount St. Michael's in Spokane, WA. Three years later, Fr. Pungente went to St. Paul's High School, Winnipeg, MB to teach elocution, English and Latin. In 1967, he spent a year at San Francisco State College studying film. He was ordained in Winnipeg in 1971 and served at St. Paul's High School as teacher, then chairman of the Manitoba Film Board. In 1976, he was appointed principal of the high school, a post he held for seven years. This was followed by two years at the Jesuit Communication Centre in London, England, for further study and pastoral ministry.

Fr. Pungente's longest posting was from 1985 as director of the Jesuit Communication Project, Toronto. It was a role he held for 34 years. In 2018, Fr. Pungente moved to Our Lady of Lourdes Parish, Toronto, for pastoral ministry and editing the online Jesuit blog *IgNation*.

FATHER ROLAND TURENNE, SJ

Feb. 14, 1924 - Dec. 9, 2023

Father Roland Turenne died on December 9, 2023, at the infirmary of the Résidence Notre-Dame de Richelieu. He would have been 100 years old in February 2024. He was the last French-Canadian Jesuit to work in Ethiopia. In 1945, Pope Pius XII entrusted the Society of Jesus in French Canada with the mission of running a public secondary school in Addis Ababa, at the request of



Ethiopia's Emperor Haile Selassie. Fr. Turenne had devoted all his years of apostolic life to the mission of Ethiopia, though he did not limit himself to the field of education.

Fr. Turenne was born in Saint-Boniface, MB and entered the Sault-au-Récollet novitiate,

Montreal in August 1943. He was sent to Texas to study science and returned to Montreal to study philosophy from 1948 to 1951. When he began his regency, he was chosen to teach at the secondary school in Addis Ababa, which the Jesuits were administering. He remained there from 1951-1954. Ethiopia became his second home. He returned to Montreal to complete the first year of his theological studies and then studied at the theologate of the Jesuit Province of Chicago. In 1957, he was ordained to the priesthood.

Fr. Turenne returned to Ethiopia in 1959 and remained there until 2017. Including his regency, his stay in Africa lasted more than 60 years. He said he had four different careers, depending on the needs of the Ethiopians: 18 years of teaching, 15 years of development work with a French NGO, then with the Jesuit Refugee Service, five years as a hospital chaplain, and finally a dozen years at Centre Galilée ■





WHAT IS A SCHOLARSHIP?

A Scholarship is a sum of money that is invested. The income from this money is used to support Jesuits in formation, current and future ministries, and senior Jesuits.

WHAT SUM IS REQUIRED TO FOUND A SCHOLARSHIP?

A moderate sum will found (begin) a Scholarship, but a Scholarship is not completed until \$15,000 has been contributed.

WHAT IS A FOUNDER'S FUND?

A Founder's Fund is a sum of at least \$50,000 that annually contributes to the expenses of educating a Jesuit, supporting current and future ministries, or caring for senior Jesuits.

FATHER JEFFREY BURWELL, SJ

Father Jeffrey S. Burwell, SJ was trained by the Jesuits as an English and French teacher and taught at St. Paul's High School in Winnipeg, MB. He then completed a PhD in Educational Administration and served for many years in the Faculty of Education at the University of Manitoba. He was pleased to be sent back to his hometown of Regina, SK to teach Catholic Studies at Campion College at the University of Regina. Along with this educational work, he served as the lead chaplain for both police officers in training at the RCMP Training Academy and inmates at the Regina Provincial Correctional Centre. He is deeply connected to the Indigenous of Saskatchewan and Manitoba and spends extended periods throughout the year with northern Dene or Cree communities.
